Partnerships and Promise 2020 – Part Two

In the August edition of the Rambler you read about the partnerships created through the Promise 2020 report from the Archdiocese of Omaha. That issue focused on one of two new partners of Holy Name School; Sacred Heart School. You also read about the Christian Urban Education Service (CUES) ⁽¹⁾; which has provided governance and financial support for Sacred Heart School for almost 40 years. The CUES Foundation has expanded its mission to provide guidance and financial support to Holy Name School and All Saints School. This issue will focus on our second partner: All Saints Catholic School.

The process to produce Promise 2020 involved extensive data gathering, listening to parish and school leaders, presentation of key findings, and deliberation on strategic questions, presenting proposals, soliciting feedback, and then refining proposals to become the recommended plan. The process took from August 2011 to May 2012. Many lay leaders were involved along with pastors, principals, and parish staff members. A Parish Steering Committee and a School Steering Committee comprised of local lay leaders and clergy were created to formulate proposals, gather feedback, study possibilities, and put forth a plan. The process was facilitated by the Meitler Consultants of Milwaukee, WI. The final document was released this past summer and assures us that Holy Name School and Parish will continue to provide pastoral guidance for our parish and excellent education programming to our children for years to come. Promise 2020 provides the platform for us to work collaboratively with Sacred Heart School and All Saints Catholic School. Our leadership will grow as three members of the Holy Name Advisory group have become part of the fabric of the CUES board (Christian Urban Education Service). Gathering strength by combining our experience and strength will provide long term sustainability for each of our schools. The following is information on the history of All Saints Catholic School.

Long ago, as the immigrant populations continued to arrive in America, move west and settle in the Midwest states, Omaha, Nebraska became a hub for many ethnic groups. As they settled just south of Dodge Street and close to the river, Catholic Churches sprang up like spring flowers. Each ethnic group felt the need for a worship space that encompassed their individual ethnic spirituality. At the time there were plenty of people to fill all of the churches and the area became lovingly known as Little Italy. As time passed it became clear that with the demographic shifts of the city, there was no longer a physical need for all of these parishes.



The inception of All Saints Catholic School happened over time. Prior to 1989 the many parishes in this area were providing kindergarten through eighth grade education services for their parish families. As mentioned above as the population moved west it became apparent that another model needed to be put in place to continue these services. From 1976-77 until 1988-89 Catholic Southeast Education Services provided middle school/junior high school to the students from six feeder schools. St. Patrick's served as the site for these grade levels. These six parishes were still providing kindergarten through fifth grade for their parish children. In the fall of 1989 the combined group of parishes needing to provide education services had grown to eight. For the 1989-90 school year All Saints School services were provided in three different buildings; Immaculate Conception, St. Ann's and St. Frances Cabrini.

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This quarterly publication goes to more than 3,800 alumni, parishioners, and friends of Holy Name in Omaha and across the nation.

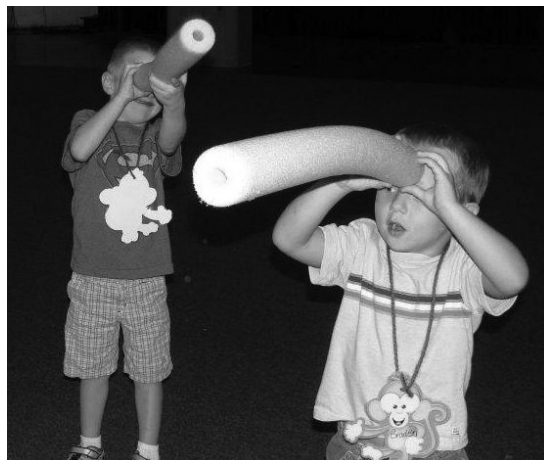

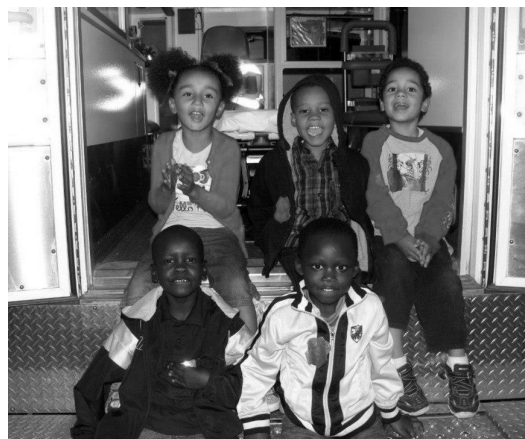

Still Waiting - IRA Charitable Rollover Extension for 2012

It remains to be seen whether Congress will re-enact the IRA Charitable Rollover for 2012. On April 26, the House Ways and Means Select Revenue Measures Subcommittee held a hearing concerning the expiring and expired tax extenders which included the IRA Charitable Rollover. Several House members testified in favor of the charitable tax extenders.

The Public Good IRA Rollover Act of 2011 ([S. 557](#)) has been introduced by the Senate. This legislation would make permanent and expand the IRA charitable rollover, lifting the \$100,000 charitable gift limit and allowing for certain giving, like to a charitable remainder trust, to begin as early as age 59 ½. The House has introduced the Public Good IRA Rollover Act ([H.R. 2502](#)) as a companion to the Senate legislation.

Whether anything is passed before the November elections still remains to be seen but it is critical it be done and that it be done early enough to allow taxpayers to take advantage of this incentive which can benefit so many charitable organizations.

Eight things to know about the IRA Charitable Rollover **as it existed before the legislation expired**:

1. The distribution from an IRA had to be made directly to the charitable organization.
2. The “donor” had to be 70 ½ or older at the time that the distribution was made.
3. The maximum amount that could qualify was \$100,000.
4. The IRA Charitable Rollover satisfied the minimum distribution requirement.
5. The amount of the IRA Charitable Rollover did not need to be reported as income on federal or Connecticut income tax returns.
6. Only distributions from traditional and Roth IRAs qualified.
7. To qualify, the distribution could only be for charitable purposes and could not be designated for a donor advised fund, supporting organization, private foundation or life-income gift (charitable trust or annuity). No goods or services could be received in exchange for the distribution (i.e. tickets or dinner).
8. The distribution could only be to a public charity. The distribution could be for capital needs, for an annual gift, to establish an endowment, or for any other charitable purpose.

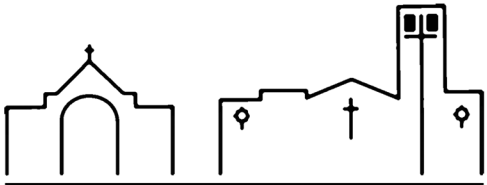
